


Activity Description

Gerald Ferguson primarily used stencils to create the work *A Lady and a Flower with Eight Lobsters*. Most of the time we think of stencils as a tool used with spray paint, however, they can also be used

with other materials such as acrylic paint and pencils. With this activity you will learn how to create and use a stencil to be used in your own drawing.

Example





Materials

1. Pencil/Pencil crayons/Markers

2. Scissors
3. Paper (at least 2 pieces)
Optional: Tape, acrylic paint

Instructions






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
Fold it in half.







Draw half of your shape on the folded side of the paper.


This will give you a symmetrical stencil.















Unfold and get your drawing paper ready.







Tape your stencil to the paper.







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Use your pencil to scribble over the stencil.
