No. 5 | Forms From Forms - Temporary Found Object Sculptures

Activity Description

Clarissa Inglis's sculpture Floor Mops turns an everyday object into a sculpture. Art has a long history of using "readymade" objects in the creation of three-dimensional artworks. For this activity, create a temporary sculpture using only objects that you find around your house. Maybe it becomes a fort, maybe a tabletop tableau. You can even turn it into a collaborative activity with your family.

Definitions

Readymade: A sculpture created from already existing objects that have been either altered slightly or are presented in a different way.

Tableau: A group of models or motionless figures that represent a scene from a story.







Instructions for selecting objects

- **Step 1.** Find objects that have similar colours, patterns, and textures. Think about scale (the size of the objects).
- **Step 2.** Try to fit these objects together in a way that is interesting. Look for holes. Try stacking them.
- **Step 3.** Try taking objects away. Is there something that makes it look unbalanced?
- **Step 4.** Sculptures are meant to be seen from all angles so walk around it. Make sure you are happy with it from all sides.
- **Step 5.** Snap a picture!
