

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DIRECTOR'S NOTES

In 1946 Frank Capra produced and directed the film *It's a Wonderful Life* based on the short story by Philip Van Doren Stern. Although the film did poorly in its initial release, it was nominated for five Academy Awards, and has been hailed by the American Film Institute as the most inspirational American film of all time. It quickly became a holiday classic, known and loved worldwide.

George Bailey, who has put his own dreams aside to help others, contemplates suicide one Christmas Eve–after suffering a financial loss that will surely ruin his business and possibly send him to jail. Heavenly intervention, in the form of George's guardian angel, Clarence Odbody, attempts to convince George that "no man is a failure who has friends" (a quote by Mark Twain).

The year 2020 has brought challenges to many. The arts industry, especially live performance suffered great losses. ACT is a community-based amateur theatre association with a mandate to:

- foster local theatre, by encouraging artistic and practical development of all facets of the art
- collect and make available materials supportive to the development of community theatre
- stimulate cooperation between all persons and groups active in community theatre

ACT was formed in 1995, which makes this year our 25th anniversary. Plans for a large-scale production and gala event were shelved in March. Our 10th annual community theatre festival was cancelled. As the year went on, I had the idea that producing a simple show, such as *It's a Wonderful Life: A Live Radio Play* might be possible on a small scale, and allow us to celebrate 25 years as well as fulfilling some of the above mandate! Before we knew it, Confederation Centre of the Arts had offered a partnership with very generous support, and we were on our way. This 'little show' has grown to be very meaningful for our small company, and has brought great joy for us, during these somewhat dark times. We are grateful to be able to perform for you this evening in a safe manner, and hope that you find the same happiness and comfort in this story that we have had over the last few weeks. The Mark Twain quote that Clarence uses is certainly true, "No man is a failure who has friends"...

Some of his favorite shows have included *Hamlet*, *The Laramie Project* and now *It's A Wonderful Life*, due to the opportunity in each to play multiple characters.

ROB THOMSON Rob Thomson was a founding member of ACT, organizer of a decade of P.E.I. Community Theatre Festivals, and teacher of 'popular theatre' in schools and a prison in the South Pacific. He has acted in and done production work for over 40 productions through the years since being dragooned into theatre at an audition he took his son to. This staging of *It's a Wonderful Life* is a special delight: it has been a quarter-century since Rob played Joseph in a Confederation Centre production of the original play and this time he gets to act the dichotomous good-and-evil roles of Clarence and Potter.
